MCC Thunderbird Powwow Unites Native Tribes for Cultural Showcase on March 9

The MCC Thunderbird Powwow is a vibrant celebration of Native American culture, featuring traditional arts, dances, and foods, fostering community and awareness.



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The Mesa Community College (MCC) Thunderbird Powwow, scheduled for March 9, is set to be a vibrant celebration of Native American culture, organized by the American Indian Institute and the Inter-Tribal Student Organization. This event, which brings together various tribes, will feature traditional dancing, art, crafts, singing, and food at the Southern and Dobson campus, marking an important cultural gathering for the second year in a row since the hiatus caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Reviving Tradition and Education

Shineka Clay, a member of The American Indian Institute, highlighted the importance of the powwow in promoting Native American representation and educational opportunities on campus. With over a thousand native students at MCC, the event aims to foster a sense of community and awareness of indigenous cultures among students. The inclusion of gourd dances, performed to honor veterans and tribal leaders, and the presence of host drum groups Wild Krew and Southern Slam, are central to this celebration of heritage and resilience.
