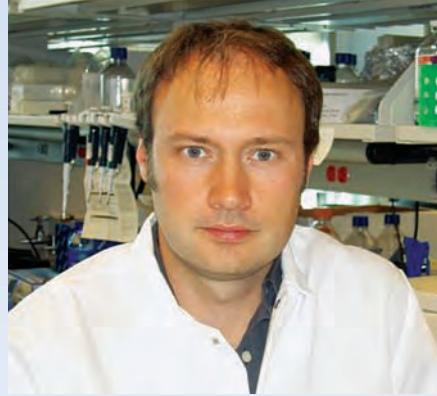


## MCC Grads Enter Arizona's Biotech Workforce



Christopher Smoke, 26, of Phoenix, graduated from the MCC Biotechnology Program in 2004 and is now an advisor for the program. He also works as a student researcher at Arizona State University, where he will receive a bachelor's degree in molecular biosciences and biotechnology this December.

Smoke said was hooked on biotechnology after just a few weeks in classes with MCC instructors Lewis Obermiller and Stanley Kikkert.

"The instructors at MCC made learning biotechnology as smooth as possible and their personable styles created a good learning environment," Smoke said.

Smoke also enjoyed the hands-on approach of the classes.

"You were able to see everything happen before your eyes," Smoke said. "We cut DNA from one organism to transform it into another organism."

Smoke said he would definitely recommend MCC's Biotechnology Program to students.

"The lab skills and problem-solving skills you learn increase your opportunity to market yourself to research labs," Smoke said. "You receive a rounded view of science that you can take in different directions."

Stephanie Savage, 30, of Scottsdale, was a former emergency medical technician (EMT) who was frustrated with not being able to do enough for her patients. She entered the MCC Biotechnology Program and now works as a research associate at TGen.

Savage called the MCC program "intense," which was just what she was looking for.

"I like to jump into things," Savage said. "The DNA concept was overwhelming, but the instructors are geniuses and their excitement was contagious. They sparked my interest, so I studied harder."

Through Obermiller's connections with TGen, Savage secured an internship at TGen and now has a paid, full-time position there. She does genetic testing on preserved tissue specimens. In her work at TGen, Savage has noticed that new employees who have gone through the MCC program enter the workforce better prepared than others.

"MCC classes are set up so you graduate more advanced than workers with undergraduate degrees from other schools," said Savage, who also attends ASU to further pursue her interest in biotechnology.

Sabolcs Szelinger, 33, of Phoenix, entered MCC's Biotechnology Program in 2001 and was one of the first students to graduate from the program with an Associate of Applied Science in Biotechnology. He interned at the VA hospital in Phoenix, and now works as a paid, full-time research associate at TGen.

Szelinger said he watched the program expand as more and more educators got involved.

"Instructors like Obermiller and Kikkert brought quality and a sense of excitement to the program," Szelinger said. "Dr. Kikkert did an awesome job of maintaining the quality of the class."

Szelinger enjoys being part of the future through biotechnology and now trains master-degreed new employees how to do lab work at TGen.

"The hands-on experience from MCC prepared me well for my job," said Szelinger, now an ASU student whose long-term goal is to earn a master's degree in molecular biology.

## Alumnus Frank Morales creates new scholarship fund with legacy gift

Frank Morales had always been interested in serving as a Spanish medical interpreter. So when he came to MCC in the early 90s in pursuit of his associate of arts and associate of general studies degrees, he opted to take Biology 160 with Barbara McGaughey as an elective - a decision which set the wheels in motion for one of the most rewarding experiences of his life.

"I was like a ship without a rudder, looking for something that would hold my interest when I retired," Morales said. Knowing about Morales's interest in becoming a Spanish medical interpreter, McGaughey referred him to a program at Chandler Regional Medical Center where doctors went to farms to provide care for

itinerant workers who didn't have insurance or transportation. "I told professor McGaughey I didn't think I was ready, but she said I was," Morales said.

Encouraged, Morales approached Chandler Regional about becoming a volunteer. The farm worker program had ended, but there was need for his skills at the information desk and working with children who were receiving immunization shots.

McGaughey set Morales on a path to complete courses in anatomy and physiology and pathophysiology while continuing to grow in his volunteerism. He eventually started volunteering at Banner Desert Medical Center and enrolled in an intense 3-month course through Banner Good Samaritan hospital to become a Certified Medical Interpreter. Morales has since volunteered innumerable hours at local hospitals and clinics and has taught medical Spanish to doctors at Banner Good Samaritan. Morales currently teaches beginning Spanish at MCC.

"The past six years have been the most rewarding and fulfilling of my life," Morales said. "I created an endowed scholarship in Barbara McGaughey's name because of her inspiration and encouragement."

The Barbara McGaughey scholarship will be awarded to a Nursing student. "I am deeply honored to have a scholarship named after me and humbled by Frank and Susan Morales's generosity," McGaughey said. "It's wonderful for people like Frank, who have been involved in education, to support it in a way that helps students financially. It's great that Frank specifically chose for this scholarship to go to nursing students because it recognizes the great need we have for well educated nurses and the wonderful job our nursing department does. It's also especially meaningful to me because my mother and two sisters were nurses and my mother would be thrilled if she were alive to know about the scholarship."

## MCC Grads Enter Arizona's Biotech Workforce

In response to Arizona's rapidly-growing biotechnology industry, Mesa Community College is joining forces with Mesa Public Schools and Arizona State University to fill the increased need for skilled bioscience lab technicians and researchers.

With help from a \$900,000 National Science Foundation grant, MCC's current biotechnology program will participate in a 2 + 2 + 2 education model where MCC students work in conjunction with ASU's Polytechnic students and Mesa Public School's high school students on an integrated genome project. Students at varying levels of expertise will contribute to the project and be co-authors of published research findings.

"This provides tremendous opportunities for students while filling a critical workforce need for the state in the biotechnology field," said Lewis Obermiller, co-director of MCC's Biotechnology Program.

Biotechnologists find, purify, and use the specific DNA sequences that carry the instructions for making particular enzymes, hormones, and other substances in order to manufacture products beneficial to human health and well-being. The processes have been around for thousands of years, with microorganisms used for fermentation processes to make bread, brew alcohol, and produce cheese. The tools that the scientists currently use to modify organisms were developed fairly recently.

**At MCC, students can receive a Certificate in Biotechnology, an Associate of Applied Science in Biotechnology, or transfer to a university.**

Instructors spark student interest by offering students hands-on experiments that engage and motivate the students. At a recent instructor-training workshop at MCC, Mesa High School science teachers used a Dorito chip and a mango to learn how to determine whether they were genetically modified.

"A lot of times students think science is very dry and stuffy," said Stanley Kikkert, co-director of MCC's Biotechnology Program. "But in science, you have to be creative. We work with ideas and we test those ideas to see if they are true."

In addition to student and faculty training, the NSF grant will allow MCC to work on establishing a formal partnership agreement with the Translational Genomics Research Institute (TGen) for MCC faculty and student research internships. Many MCC students have already interned at TGen and several currently hold full-time jobs there.

## Spotlight on Careers

Be sure to look for a dynamic new section on MCC's website called Spotlight on Careers. The page provides potential students with the opportunity to view short video clips on today's hottest occupations. The videos are a collaborative effort between MCC Media Arts Instructor Cyndi Greening, MCC Media Arts students, and MCC's Marketing Department. Mary Jordan, MCC's Coordinator of Marketing, said this pilot project came to life when Greening approached Marketing with the idea of promoting programs online via videos featuring interviews with professors, students, and career professionals.

"Our collaborative intent was to further position MCC as the primary educational resource for preparation for today's job market," Jordan said. "Utilizing MCC's

website for marketing purposes responds to the desire of today's students to find key information online and reduces our dependence on print materials."

The four career programs that are spotlighted include biotechnology, dental assisting, media arts, and nurse assisting. The four programs were chosen based on course availability and employment opportunities. In addition to interviews with MCC professors and students, Gov. Janet Napolitano's economic policy adviser, Darcy Renfro, is featured on the videos and provides job opportunity statistics.

Jordan said Greening was instrumental in overseeing the project.

"Greening brought her teaching and real-world expertise to the project," Jordan said.

"She divided the students into teams and immediately started filming interviews and editing the footage."

The end result was very advantageous for both MCC students and MCC's Marketing Department. The students gained valuable hands-on working experience while producing a high-quality marketing product for the college. Plans are in the works to create a specific Media Arts class to produce more videos for the college.

"We will be developing this project further by building on the collaboration with Instruction, Marketing, and MCC's Media Arts Department to highlight more programs and transfer opportunities," Jordan said.

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## Message from the President



As the fall semester begins at Mesa Community College, plans for MCC's \$111 million portion of the 2004 bond initiative continue to move forward. Through collaboration and community partnerships, we've created a plan to build new facilities and refurbish existing buildings in a cost-effective manner. When you return to visit MCC, expect to see several changes on our campuses.

On the east side of the Southern and Dobson campus, a new parking area will join the existing northeast and southeast lots, to be completed by December 2006. Additional security cameras and new computerized key systems will enhance security campus wide.

On the west side of campus, groundbreaking for a new physical science building is anticipated for January 2007. Facility plans originally called for the construction of new Physical Science and Health and Wellness buildings. The impact of rising construction costs created the need for a new approach to plans for the Health and Wellness building, slated as the last building to be constructed at Southern and Dobson. Faculty in the Physical Sciences and Health and Wellness departments collaborated to construct one building with the same square footage as the two that were originally proposed. Once the new Physical Science building is completed, the existing Physical Science building will be refurbished into a state-of-the-art facility. The remodel is scheduled to begin March 2008.

Future goals continue to evolve as faculty and college leaders examine classroom needs to accommodate growth. Construction to expand our Red Mountain campus is scheduled for April 2008, and groundbreaking for the Performing and Fine Arts building at Southern and Dobson is scheduled for 2010. Plans for MCC's downtown campus are also in the works as we partner with the City of Mesa to build a Fire Science Training Academy.

This is an exciting time as MCC develops partnerships to meet the educational needs of our community. We will continue to provide updates on MCC construction projects in future issues of MCC's Alumni and Friends newsletter.

## MCC Partners with Mesa Arts Center

Mesa Community College and the Mesa Arts Center have entered a cooperative partnership to make art studio classes available to residents with the option of earning college credit. If students are not interested in earning credit, they may request a "pass" option from their instructors.

The Mesa Arts Center's adult art classes will be facilitated and taught by Mesa Arts Center instructors while MCC staff work behind the scenes to assure the classes continue to meet the highest standards.

"MCC is pleased to partner with the City of Mesa and the Mesa Arts Center in this exciting new endeavor," said Rodney Holmes, dean of instruction at MCC. "Increased access to state-of-the-art facilities, studio time, and cutting-edge equipment will be of great benefit to the students and community members who take advantage of these new opportunities."

Mesa Arts Center's adult education program was designated to cease operation as part of cost reduction measures for the City of Mesa's 2006-2007 budget. Mesa Community College came forward as an ideal partner because of their current expansion plans for facilities and programs in the Downtown Mesa area.

The partnership will allow the Mesa Arts Center to charge less for some classes. Classes are available in theatre, dance, ceramics, sculpture, and many other disciplines. The sessions follow a 16-week semester.
