#### Barbara Boros, Associate Dean of Enrollment Services at MCC

Barbara Boros joined MCC's Student Affairs team as the Associate Dean of Enrollment Services on July 2, 2007. Among many other duties, Barbara will serve as our Registrar and oversee Records and Registration processes.

Barbara comes to MCC from Estrella Mountain Community College, where she was the Registrar and Director of Enrollment Services. Her responsibilities included Admissions, Records, Registration, Recruitment, Assessment, Advisement, and International Students. Additionally, Barbara successfully implemented and managed the EMCC HOTLINE call center that focused on recruitment and retention activities that support student success.

Prior to arriving in Phoenix, Barbara was the Registrar and Director of Admissions, Records, Registration, Recruitment, and International Students at Cuyahoga Community College in Cleveland, Ohio's oldest and largest community college serving over 55,000 students annually.

While at Cuyahoga Community College, Barbara also served as the Director of the College Information Center that responds to over 350,000 incoming calls annually for its multi-campus environment. The comprehensive center also supports recruitment and retention activities through outbound calls, web mail, payment collection, and live chat. Barbara has made numerous presentations related to

Cuyahoga's center at League for Innovation Conferences and others throughout the country.

Barbara has also served as Associate Director of Admissions, Records, and Recruitment at Ursuline College, and Training and Development Manager at Progressive Insurance. Her extensive experience in Student Affairs with an emphasis on Enrollment Management in a one-stop, outcomes-based environment makes her a valuable addition to the college. # **Q&A series with Acting President Bernie Ronan**

This is the first in a series of Q&As with our acting president Dr. Bernie Ronan.

## Q. What have the past several weeks been like for you as acting president?

A. I am still somewhat overwhelmed and humbled when I think about the honor of having been asked by Dr. Glasper to serve as acting president of MCC. But to be more specific to the question, I find the pace hectic and exhilarating. I am energized and rewarded by the help and support I receive on a daily basis from the college community, inspired by our faculty's tireless commitment to excellence in teaching and learning and quite frankly, pretty tired by day's end.

## Q. What are the most important issues on your plate at this time?

A. It is difficult to single out the most important issues because every department — every area of the College — has important issues. MCC's top priority is, of course, our commitment to excellence in teaching and learning. And for me the central focus in this regard is on how well we are serving the students who have enrolled in our college.

This semester will be the transition to a whole new student information system (NSIS), which is a major event for us. I am asking our faculty and staff to give special attention to this transition so we maintain our teaching and learning activities while we are shifting over to NSIS.

During my time as acting president, I will fully support our primary mission of teaching and learning. I outlined at convocation on August 13 three strategic issues in this regard that I will be giving attention to: 1) increased accountability as it relates to things such as class size, student retention, and college readiness; 2) working with our East Valley educational partners to establish one of the strongest P-20 educational systems in the state — and the nation, focusing especially on the new P-20 Center we are building with NAU and Mesa Public Schools at our new Downtown Campus; 3) the educational needs of Boomers who want to learn and want to do "real" work —which could be a significant 4th revenue stream for the college.

## Q. As acting president, what level of importance do you place on communications?

A. It is a top priority. Next week you'll receive my first "Over Morning Coffee" email. These emails will be informal quick reads focusing on what my thoughts and priorities are for the college as I drink my first cup of coffee. To make these emails relevant to all of you, I am asking and hoping you will share with me the questions you have about the college that come to mind as you start your day. Please email me at

bernie.ronan@mcmail.maricopa.edu and I will reply within 48 hours. I will share these questions and answers with the college community without names and I will always honor confidentiality. Those who know me will agree when I say: I appreciate and value informal time with faculty and staff and I intend to continue to do that. Please stop me when you see me walk by, I welcome the chance to chat with you.

### Q. Are you going to apply for the position of president of MCC?

A. First of all, I was as surprised as everyone else when Dr. Glasper asked me to serve as acting president.

I did not seek this position. As far as applying for the position of president, I have not decided. The deadline for applying is September 1 so I will be making my decision within the next couple of weeks, and I will let you know what I decide to do.

### Campus Construction Update

### Southern and Dobson Campus—east side

Parking improvements to the Mesa Community College Southern and Dobson campus provided students with one less thing to worry about as they began fall semester. Constructions crews spent the summer adding a new parking lot on the east side of campus. The new lot connects the north end of campus to the south end of campus. The ability to pass through the new parking lot is a welcome option for students and visitors who previously had to exit the campus and go back onto surface streets, then re-enter the campus as they hunted for parking spots.

"It's definitely the number one improvement," said Richard Cluff, director of maintenance at MCC. "People are grateful to be able to go from the south end of campus to the north end."

MCC's new tennis courts on the east side are also finished, and grass is growing in the new multipurpose/soccer field by the Longmore Avenue entrance. Richard and his crew are busy cleaning up and putting the finishing touches on this area that has seen many changes in the past few months.

### Southern and Dobson Campus—west side

On the west side of campus, construction of the new 62,000 square foot physical science building remains on schedule. The foundation work is complete, including footings, stem walls and elevator pits. Crews are beginning work on the outer brick walls of the new building. The masonry work for the walls is expected to reach a height of 16 feet by August 31.

The new physical science building and planetarium, utilizing solar power through an SRP donation, will include state-of-the-art science labs to support chemistry, engineering and physics students. Future plans are in the works for refurbishing the existing Physical Science building into a

Health and Wellness building. Planning also continues for identifying the types of classroom space needed for Communication and Humanities educational initiatives.

#### Southern and Dobson Campus—central

Remodeling the Kirk Student Center is another part of MCC's campus improvements. A planning committee started work this summer to determine the priorities for the remodel. The committee will consider how to enhance the student and community space in the most efficient manner. MCC has \$1.3 million available for remodeling the Kirk Center.

#### **Red Mountain Campus**

At the Red Mountain campus, faculty and college leaders will select an architect by the end of the month to design a new building which will house four life science labs, a music/drama multi-use room, classrooms and office space. A small cyber cafe is included in the plans. The existing science space will be remodeled to accommodate the physical science labs.

"By the end of fall semester we will have selected both an architect and a construction manager," said Jo Wilson, Red Mountain's Dean of Instruction. "During spring semester we will continue to design and plan, with groundbreaking anticipated for the summer of 2008."

#### **Downtown Campus**

Plans for MCC's Downtown Campus are moving forward, with \$10 million set aside from the 2004 bond initiative. The campus is already a reality, with Phase I already well underway. More details on MCC's Downtown Campus will be available in September.

Money from the 2004 bond initiative makes improvements to our college possible.

### How to enroll for SIS training

Enrollment is self-service. Just login to your HRMS account at www.maricopa.edu/hrms and follow the instructions below:

- 1. Click Employee Self Service on the left.
- 2. Click Training and Development on the left.
- 3. Click Request Training Enrollment on the left (it may take a few seconds for the next screen to load).
- 4. Click Search by Course Name.
- 5. Type SIS into the Course Name box.
- 6. Click the Search button.
- 7. To view a course description, click the triangular button then click the OK button to go back to the list).
- 8. Click the View Available Sessions link for the course you wish to attend.

- 9. Click the session number of an open course.
- 10. If the session dates and times are not acceptable, click your browser's Back button to choose again.
- 11. If the course you have chosen is full, you may check the box to be added to the waiting list.
- 12. Once you have made your choice, click the Continue button at the bottom.
- 13. Click the Submit button at the bottom.
- 14. Click OK.
- 15. To verify your enrollment, click Training Summary on the left and look at the status column.
- 16. If you wish to cancel your enrollment, click the Cancel button next to the course, then click OK to confirm.
- 17. Click Sign Out in the top right corner when you are done.
