When Ernesto Mendoza entered the Electronics Technology Program at Mesa Community College, he had absolutely no prior electronics knowledge or experience.

> Today, as a result of his MCC degree, he is employed by the Federal Aviation Administration as an Airway Transportation System Specialist. It's a job he loves and one that has excellent career possibilities.

Airport. Students who enroll in the program must complete a year before they are eligible to apply to the FAA for the program.

Students who are accepted become FAA interns and work part-time for the FAA in their local offices in Tempe, with the understanding that they are required to complete their AAS degree in Electronics Technology. The FAA works around student academic schedules to make sure they can

I came into the program so inexperienced that I did not even know what a digital multimeter was," Mendoza said. "I never thought in my wildest dreams that I would land a fantastic career like I did with just an associate degree. 77

MCC Electronics Program director JD Neglia remembers Mendoza as a dedicated student who was not afraid to take risks.

"Rarely do I see students with such a single-minded focus on such a specific goal," Neglia said. "He had heard of our FAA partnership and wanted to get started as soon as possible. It was a joy to see him work through the program from beginning to end, letting absolutely nothing get in his way."

Neglia said MCC's Electronics Technology Program is the only FAA-certified electronics program in Arizona and the primary supplier of technicians for Sky Harbor

finish. Once they complete the AAS degree, they are eligible for full-time, permanent hire by the FAA.

Mendoza and his fellow classmate, John Deluca, were accepted to the FAA program and finished their degrees. Mendoza's first initial training lasted two months and Deluca has continued with his training because of his discipline.

"John and I both love our jobs," Mendoza said. "The degree that I earned and worked very hard for at MCC has been worth its weight in gold."

Mendoza's starting salary with the FAA is \$40.000 with an additional \$6.750 for locality pay.

Neglia said although the FAA says that there is no guarantee of hire, all of the MCC students who have gone through the program have been offered full-time, permanent positions with the FAA.

"This is a terrific, recession-proof and offshore outsourcing-proof career," Neglia said. "It's recession proof because airports and air travel are not going away. Even in the worst of times, air travel continues. And regardless of travel volume, the airport electronics must always be fully operational. This requires technicians. It is also offshore outsourcing-proof because the electronics technicians must be physically at the airports where the equipment is."

Mendoza said the program is a fantastic opportunity for all MCC electronic technology students.

"The possibilities are amazing," Mendoza said. "Students should never have the mentality that they will never be qualified. I didn't think I was qualified when I first applied, but here I am now.'

Creates Endowment to Assist Students

Mesa Community College graduate Jamey Taylor's college experience has inspired him to create an endowment with the Maricopa Colleges Foundation to assist financially-strapped students pursuing higher education. His planned gift of \$50,000 will be distributed between four departments at MCC and provide a variety of resources to students with financial need. "MCC was like a home away from home for me, encouraging me and supporting me academically," said Taylor, who attended MCC from 1992-2000. "I hope this helps students have less of a financial burden."

His passion for encouraging others began when Taylor was a student. He started a disability club, became a member of Phi Theta Kappa and wrote for the student newspaper. He became a student advocate, attending district board meetings and bringing back information to the students. Taylor graduated with a degree in General Studies in 2000.

Taylor's donation will honor his deceased parents and come from The Jamey, Florence and Thomas Lee Taylor Foundation A portion of the money is earmarked for MCC's Disability Department, where he received assistance when he was a student.



The money will be distributed as follows

\$10,000 to the Disability Department, half of which will be used for material and equipment and half for student testing expenses, to be paid to the physician.

\$10,000 to the Counseling Department to help students with financial need purchase textbooks.

\$25,000 to the Testing Center to remodel a room and pay for GED testing for students with financial need. A plaque will be placed in the center with information on the donation

\$5,000 to the Tutoring Center for tutoring assistance and the purchase of upgraded software equipment.

"I am providing this money to give back," Taylor said.

"The gift says, 'Hey, I was in your shoes,' and will
encourage others to give back as well and to do it
in an unselfish way."

Taylor's donation will come from his estate and is an example of a planned gift. Making a bequest to MCC through a will or trust is a way to demonstrate a commitment to education for future generations. Whether it's a specific dollar amount or a gift of property, planned gifts ensure access and opportunity for many students and provide specific tax advantages for donors.

MCC's Director of Development, Jared Langkilde, said Jamey is an excellent example of a graduate who has successfully completed his studies at MCC and is doing great things in our community.

"It is humbling to see former students like Jamey, pause the pace of a busy life for a moment of reflection and decided to give back to the place and people that helped him begin his life's journey after high school," Langkilde said.

New tiers volunteers provided about 25 volunteers who donated more than 500 hours to assisting MCC students.


Bruce Reid, head of the New Frontiers' volunteer committee, said his volunteers like to stay active and be useful. "The college gives us so much, that in these times of budget cuts, we love to step in and give back," Reid said.

During the spring 2010 semester, New Frontiers contributed 390 volunteer hours directly to MCC activities. Most of that was done in support of registration at the Dobson and Red Mountain campuses. They also funded three \$1,000 scholarships for MCC students this past year. Reid said he and his wife, Joy, enjoy not only volunteering, but also the educational travel opportunities the group offers.

"We've been on 26 trips in Arizona and haven't covered the same place twice," Reid said. "There is so much to see and do in Arizona, from the scenic beauty of southeastern Arizona to the museums and history in Tucson." Reid said the trips have also taken them to offbeat places such as a Camel Farm near Yuma and a town so small it has only a handful of residents.

New Frontiers has approximately 450 members and is continually growing. Other activities include computer courses, community service projects, hiking adventures, literary discussions, studio art groups and theater parties. The group is a resource for helping adults set goals and activities for their individual learning interests, which, according to members, also often leads to diverse, rewarding friendships.
