

New Hiring Process Approved for Non-Faculty Positions

PAF IMPLEMENTED FOR NON-FACULTY POSITIONS

Managers and Department Chairs: If you have a vacant position, an idea for a new position, an emergency hire, or other personnel actions related to a board approved position, then please note this new procedure. Effective immediately a new Personnel Action Form (PAF) has been implemented that will provide justifications for personnel actions, better coordination with fiscal and HR, and centralize approval of actions through the President's cabinet.

The PAF, available from your Vice President, is filled out by the manager/department chair, reviewed with HR and Fiscal, and submitted to the VP. The VP will then present the requested personnel action to the President's cabinet for approval. Once approved, the signed form will be routed to HR for implementation and next steps.

Please note: The PAF process is for non-faculty positions. Faculty positions will still go through the faculty staffing process and the VP will present to Cabinet following that process.

A hallmark of the PAF is the inclusion of the Guiding Principles for Strategic Decision Making (http://www.mc.maricopa.edu/other/employees/ia/bulletin/Oct14_08/PresCorner(3).html). Every position is scrutinized to determine its impact on Student Success and Teaching and Learning. Using the PAF will also benefit MCC decision making. The information on the PAF will be utilized to keep a data table of budgeted and reallocated positions up to date and accurate. This information can then better be used to aide institutional decision making.

For the last two years, MCC has held the District record for the highest number of employment related Prior Year Commitments. Prior Year Commitments are monetary expenditures that should have been submitted prior to the end of a fiscal year in a prior year. One goal of Human Resources this year is to reduce the number of prior year commitments by 75%. Your help is needed to meet this goal. Special Olympics 2009

Mesa Community College is proud to host 1,500 athletes for the Summer Olympic Games in partnership with Special Olympics Arizona. The three-day event will be held at MCC's Southern and Dobson campus from April 30-May 2, under the direction of MCC's Disability Resources and Services and MCC's Athletic Department.

A wide variety of volunteer opportunities are still available for MCC staff and students, including setting up, escorting athletes, staging, tearing down or just cheering on the athletes as they compete. SOA provides their own volunteers, but MCC volunteers are also welcome to participate. SOA recommends volunteers be age 16 and up, or with a family member. Volunteers receive a t-shirt, lunch and beverage.

Many MCC student athletes will also participate as part of their service learning component. Athletes from the various athletic programs will help oversee the full spectrum of events taking place on their home fields, including track, shot put, hurdles, volleyball, gymnastics, softball and even kayaking at Tempe Town Lake. There will also be athlete wellness checks between competitions with local doctors donating their time and talent.

The games will begin on Thursday with registration at 2 p.m., followed by various competitions on Thursday and Friday. On Friday evening there will be dinner, the athlete march, opening ceremonies and a dance. More competitions and award presentations finish up the event on Saturday. Those who are interested in volunteering are asked to indicate date/time they want to volunteer and provide alternate times of availability.

In exchange for hosting this event, the Special Olympics will donate \$10,000 into an endowed scholarship fund for students with disabilities for every year MCC hosts the event. The money from the scholarship will be awarded to students who meet specific qualifications, to be decided by the DRS, used for technology or other approved needs.

MCC has been bidding to host the event for the past two years. Wink Harner and Jared Langkilde invited the athletic department to participate after SOA notified them that MCC would be hosting the games this year.

Jeff Fore, MCC's Athletic Director, said it's a perfect event for the service learning component to the athletic program.

"One thing I required when I came to MCC was that every team be involved in a community service project of some sort," Jeff said

Wink said for the past two years, the event has been held at Arizona State University, where SOA was under contract and had to pay a hefty facility fee. Organizers say MCC's campus is ideal for the event with the locations of the fields in relation to the parking lots and classrooms. MCC will provide updates on parking restrictions that will affect students and staff as the event draws near.

Gail Gilmartin, VP of Corporate Fulfillment and Volunteerism at SOA, said the response for help from MCC has been fantastic.

"We are so happy to hold this at MCC," Gilmartin said. "You have no idea how easy MCC is making this for us. I've had such a great experience working here with everyone at MCC."

Gilmartin said she wants people to realize that the event is not just about the sports competition.

"Special Olympics is part of life and it's about trying to get everyone in the community involved," Gilmartin said. "It's about inclusion and unification."

Special Olympics Arizona is part of the world's leading program of sports training and athletic competition for people with intellectual disabilities, and boasts a 30-year track record of creating positive attitudes towards its athletes worldwide, and a commitment to athlete empowerment, dignity and leadership.

Dr. Seuss' Birthday at Mesa Community College

Expert Drummer Shares Knowledge with MCC Students

Mesa Community College instructor Andy Seagle's studio recording students recently had the opportunity to pick up a few tips on the fine art of tuning drums from expert drummer Dan Tomlinson. Tomlinson visited Seagle's class at MCC to speak about and demonstrate drum-tuning techniques.

Tomlinson has been the tour drummer for musician Lyle Lovett for the past 16 years and has performed on *The Tonight Show*, *David Letterman*, *Grammy Award* shows and music video segments. Dan has recorded albums with Lyle Lovett and Acoustic Alchemy. Dan is also the author of *The World of Flams*, voted best drum book of the year 2000 in *Drum* magazine.



Seagle, program director of MCC's audio production technology program, said MCC students are fortunate to have a high-caliber drummer share his expertise.

"Drum tuning is a lost art and it makes all the difference in the world when you are recording (to have a well-tuned drum)," Seagle said. "It's a unique thing and students get an appreciation for how hard it is. Plus, he's just a really great guy."

Tomlinson attended MCC during the late '70s and played in the MCC Big Band. He then went on to play for Lyle Lovett and today enjoys doing a combination of playing, recording and teaching.

Tomlinson said tuning drums is difficult because drums have the largest amount of overtones, so it's hard to hear pitch. There is no machine to measure overtones.

"Most professional drummers don't know how to tune drums," Tomlinson said. "It's kind of an art that I learned by trial and error from 35 years of playing drums."




