

SERVICE EXCELLENCE AWARD

Keith Heffner, Music Department Faculty Nominated by Judy Taussia



Keith Hefner has a history of successfully adapting technology for use by the disabled. Several years ago, Keith faced the challenge of accommodating a blind student in his Music Recording Studio program. It was an extraordinary problem because the equipment was designed for the sighted. The Music and Disability Resources departments collaborated to create a computer music workstation for the blind/visually impaired.

This year Keith was awarded an Innovative Project Grant to use Soundbeam II, a system that creates music through physical movement. His goal was to use it with disabled students who had never had the opportunity to create music. He is currently working with about six students with various disabilities and the results are sensational.

He makes it all seem possible, and for that reason, he is able to show to other faculty that this flexible creativity can be applied in other areas. He is now considering ways that the Music Department can collaborate to bring Soundbeam to other departments.

One of Keith's students, Kim Wing, states, "Keith Hefner is a very caring instructor. He is willing to work with students with disabilities and goes out of the way to make me comfortable while I am in his class. I enjoy working with him on the Soundbeam II project because he is very encouraging and he makes me laugh. Keith is helping me so that I can help other people."

Cheryl goes out of her way to look for official professional growth activities, checking the district and CTL schedules often. She also engages in unofficial professional growth behaviors by soliciting help from CTL staff on projects or questions that she has.

Cheryl is the direct supervisor for the front desk staff in the CTL. Cheryl works closely with these students to keep them on task and focused in their work. She also serves as a mentor and role model as they pursue their college degrees.

As the CTL Office Coordinator, Cheryl is, in many ways, the "face" of the CTL. Cheryl's work efforts and daily behaviors contribute to the CTL in a positive way, thus enabling the CTL to more positively impact the campus environment and academic community.




ADJUNCT FACULTY AWARD


Tishin Donkersley, Psyhology Department Faculty

Tishin Donkersley currently works as an adjunct professor of Sport Psychology. She has been responsible for the development and implementation of the Sport Psychology program at MCC where she now teaches two full courses with a waiting list. She has brought a multi-disciplinary approach to this program where she combines the psychology department, exercise science, and athletics. Many of her students are student-athletes, exercise science, and psychology students who use their knowledge of the field and in their lives to improve their performance.

Once Tishin created our Sport Psychology Program (before her it was only a class that hardly made), she began developing relationships with the Athletic and Exercise Science Departments. Over the past two years at MCC, Tishin has pooled the resources of the coaching staffs and psychology department to develop a working program for students who are pursuing a collegiate level sports program. In conjunction with Exercise Science Chair Ann Stine, Sport Psychology was incorporated into the curriculum for the Coaching Certification program and Exercise Psychology and Sport Psychology seminars have been developed for fitness professionals to earn CEU credits.

Tishin believes that each person holds true potential and the joy is in discovering it and nurturing that potential. Her methods are motivating, inspiring, tailored, and relevant.

Mesa Community College held the largest job fair in the East Valley where hundreds of employers were on hand recruiting potential employees.




Hall of Fame Honors


