Geography instructor Steven Bass has taken on the commitment to making MCC a little bit greener. He founded the Green Group, which is comprised of faculty, staff, and students who get together to brainstorm ideas to "Green" MCC. He was also part of the first FLPC for Sustainability.

Steve took action to propel the MCC Recycling Program to a higher, more visible level by submitting a grant proposal to the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality. A \$46,000 grant was awarded to MCC, a major accomplishment and gift to the MCC Community. Steve partnered with the City of Mesa to have 40 large barrels installed in high traffic areas where students, employees, and all campus visitors could begin immediately diverting waste from Arizona's landfills. Through the grant, he was able to order interior bins which were installed in several buildings where volunteers generously agreed to assist him in making this

Erika Harp has been an invaluable asset to the Center for Service-Learning. In September 2002, we received a large grant to coordinate an AmeriCorps program. Erika was instrumental in getting the grant program started by attending training, designing program materials, and recruiting new members.

The program has grown to one of the largest in the nation. Erika has coordinated 704 members through completion of their service contracts and is currently tracking 447 additional students. Upon completion, all students will earn an educational award of \$1,000-\$2,363! In addition, she has conducted numerous AmeriCorps workshops and orientations. Her most recent, for the MCC Connectors program, had more than 100 attendees.

One AmeriCorps members state that Erika "is very supportive to students' needs and encourages academic and personal growth. She is a joy to be around and



vivacious." Another student credits Erika with keeping him on track and motivated in the program.






