### Filmmakers share Iranian culture with U.S audiences

Women's History Month may be over but the Office of International Education is still feeling the aftershocks of the Women's Iranian Film Festival. The International Education office received international coverage for the recent festival with Ida Mansourian, Acting Director of International Education, being interviewed by an Iranian radio station in Prague.

Festival screenings and activities were coordinated by Ida; Don Castro, MCC English professor; and Mashid Bozorgnia, film critic. The festival was made possible by grants from the Arizona Humanities Council and the Maricopa Community College District Office of International and Intercultural Education and through contributions from the Iranian Community of Phoenix.

The festival featured six films by and about Iranian women. An event highlight was appearances by Rakhshan Bani-Etemad, Susan Taslimi, and Tahmineh Milani, directors of four of the films shown (Rakhshan had two films). Two of the women came to MCC from Iran while the other came from Sweden. After the movie viewings concluded, the women attended a reception in the lobby to answer audience questions about the films they directed. "The directors were very open and receptive of audience members" said Ida. The women even indulged a few audience members in signing autographs and programs.

All of the directors are well-known internationally. Tahmineh was arrested and threatened with execution while filming *Hidden Half*. American filmmakers, a list which included director

## Adaptive computer station brings music to visually impaired students

"Mesa Community College will be a leader among community colleges, providing an innovative and intellectual learning-centered environment that is responsive, adaptable, and inclusive."

This is MCC's vision statement. It is a challenge to explore the needs and concerns of the community and find ways to implement solutions to address them directly. During the Fall semester at MCC, the Music Department in cooperation with Disability Resources and Services began exploring the concept of creating a specially designed computer music workstation for the blind/vision-impaired. This came about because one of our blind students, Sarah Outwater, wanted to participate more fully in her music studies.

February 6th, 2004 marked the inaugural date for an exciting and innovative program for our campus. It is now possible for a blind/vision-impaired student to compose, record, and print music using a synthesizer and adaptive music software in the computer music lab in the Music Department. "We now have one fully functional station that can be used by any blind/vision-impaired music student already familiar with JAWS and willing to learn how to use music

software," says Keith Heffner, the Department's Music Technology Instructor. JAWS is an interactive speech program that enables text to be converted to spoken word for the blind. A company named **Dancing Dots** incorporated the JAWS technology into Cakewalk and Sibelius (both popular music software programs for the PC) to create an adaptive version that blind musicians can use.

Sarah is currently in the process of composing original music in the lab. Her goals are to use the system in a creative way, giving voice to her music, as well as becoming proficient enough to instruct new students in how to use Cake-Talking and Sibelius-Speaking (the hybrid versions of the music software). Heffner stated that "The department's goal is to eventually promote the system in our community while developing coursework that will allow blind/vision-impaired music students to take advantage of this emerging technology." Steven Spielberg, signed an international petition of solidarity calling for Tahmineh's release. Another director, Susan Taslimi, is a former Iranian actress who immigrated to Sweden because of problems with the Iranian government. Susan now lives in Sweden and her work is sponsored by the Consulate General of Sweden and the Swedish Film Institute.

Each showing drew crowds of over 300 attendees. Originally each film was to be viewed once but due to widespread interest and demand for tickets, a second showing was added for each film.

## What is the Trip Reduction Program and why do we have to take those surveys?

The surveys are coming! What surveys?? You know those surveys that want to know your work schedule, how often you carpool, ride the bus, and where you live. Ohhh those... Why do we have to take those every year anyway? Don't know.

The annual surveys are conducted by the Maricopa County Trip Reduction Program, which was created as a result of an Air Quality Bill passed by the Arizona Legislature in 1988. The purpose of the Trip Reduction Program is to encourage activities to reduce emissions, traffic congestion, and improve the air quality in Maricopa County.

Every Maricopa County employer with over 51 employees is mandated to participate in the program and complete the annual surveys. The surveys are



important because they assist the County in planning bus routes, bike paths, and highways based on the residence location of individuals who respond.

The County takes these surveys very seriously and expects each organization to reach a target number of completed questionnaires. If an employer does not reach the target number they will have to re-take the survey.

The surveys for 2004 will be administered in April. A drawing for prizes such as restaurant certificates, movie tickets, and more will be held for employees who complete them.
