Dr. Nora Amavisca Reyes has been selected by the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), District 1, to receive the Latino Educator Leader Award. Nora was recently recognized at the Arizona LULAC District 1 Conference, which took place at the Wells Fargo Conference Center in Phoenix. She was nominated by Ray Gano, District 1 director of LULAC, Arizona chapter. Nora was selected from a committee of prominent members of the League for her unselfish and outstanding contributions throughout her professional career.

"I believe...that each one of us being recognized is merely a representative of many who have supported us, believed in us, and made numerous personal sacrifices for us in order to give us the opportunities which have enabled us to be where we are today," said Nora. "Being recognized by an organization with the philosophy and purposes of LULAC truly validates the efforts I have undertaken through my



personal and professional endeavors to promote equal opportunities for all and to increase appreciation for the richness of our multicultural society."

Nora is a residential faculty member in MCC's Education Dept. where she teaches Cultural Diversity in Education and Children's Literature to aspiring teachers. She also serves as director of the Xalapa

Study Abroad program for educators and social workers.

Nora has a bachelor's degree in Elementary Education, a master's in Multicultural/Bilingual Education, and a doctorate in Curriculum and Instruction with a specialization in Bilingual Education. She has been teaching at MCC since 1997 and "loving it." Nora is the youngest of seven children and the only one born in the United States, just months after her family's emigration from Mexico. Nora is bilingual. She grew up in a Spanish-speaking household.

Other awards Nora has received include the Maricopa Institute for Learning Fellowship (2004–2005) and the MCC Faculty Excellence Award (2003). She is the recipient of two recent grants: the District International and Intercultural grant (2002) and the EDP grant (2001). Nora also participated in MCC's Kaleidoscope program (2000–2001).

The Technology, Theatre and Performing Arts, and Biotechnology departments will feature open houses for students who wish to visit the departments directly. These departments will also have hands-on demonstrations.
