
Free Concert To Celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Evelyn Plantillas Celebrates Golden Anniversary As MesaCC Student

Among those celebrating Mesa Community College's 50th Anniversary in 2015 is one of its first students, Evelyn (Mosley) Plantillas. Academically precocious, she was just 16 years old when she enrolled after graduating from Tempe High School. Her biology class was in what is now the wedding hall of the Landmark Restaurant at Main and Extension streets. She wrote English essays in the current salad bar and took an archery class in the vacant lot filled with cottonwood trees across the street. Choir was held in a portable building in the parking lot.

Her second year, she moved to MCC's big, new campus at Southern and Dobson, formerly a sheep pasture. The young student wondered why MCC would build a campus so far out in farm land.


Because of her young age, Plantillas says MCC was a better fit for her than going directly to a larger, four-year college.

"It was a very small, intimate and nurturing environment," explained. "Everyone got to know everybody. I even worked for Jinnett Kirk (dean of students) as a nanny for her children for a while. And, all of the students were about my age, not like today where they are of all ages including people re-careering."

Plantillas adds that although the college was in its first years, it provided educational expansive experiences. She especially enjoyed touring with the choir throughout Northern Arizona, which back in the 60s included some pretty small towns eager for the entertainment.

Being a part of Associated Women Students was very important because she was among a few selected to go to a conference in New Mexico. Being one of seven children, travel was rare for her growing up so the opportunities the college offered were valuable.

Her mother was a Tempe elementary school teacher. When Plantillas graduated from Arizona State University, she followed in her mother's footsteps, but they led her to San Jose, California, where she taught for 27 years. She taught briefly at ASU but when she returned to Arizona, she



went to work for Gilbert Public Schools.


Plantillas says her experience at MCC was so positive that she always wanted to give something back. She served for nine years on the college's alumni board including a years as its president.

"I wanted to see what was happening at my alma mater," she said. "Education has been my life. I taught elementary ed in California and was teaching high school in Arizona, serving as chair of the special education department. Going to Mesa (Community College) was a very good segue for some of those special needs students."
