

D'Anna: 'Nancy Drew' and the case of the mystery Mesa machine

For more than a month, Kim Nelson of the Mesa Transportation Department has been doing a Nancy Drew impersonation, trying to solve The Mystery of the Mysterious Machine.

Back in September, someone reported finding a large, unidentified piece of machinery on the side of the road in Northeast Mesa. It was so heavy it took a crane to lift it and bring it back to the Mesa utility yard.

"I'm amazed that whoever lost it didn't notice when it fell out," Nelson tells me. "The police department does not have any reports from anyone saying they lost a heavy piece of equipment or part or whatever it is."

So Nelson did a little sleuthing on her own. She sent pictures out to city employees, and someone said it might be part of a press used to make pharmaceuticals. From there Kim learned there was a pharmaceutical manufacturer on McKellips Road, not far from where the machine was found, that went out of business a couple of years ago.

My primary role was to stand and be amazed as Sergio whipped up an amazing salad with a pasta, chicken and tomato sauce creation.

Our team competed against four others featuring chefs from Il Vinaio, The Grille at Las Sendas, Nando's and Echo 5. Mesa City Councilman David Luna was on the Echo 5 team with chef Mitch Aiton, and MCC student body president Aron Mixon was teamed with Las Sendas Grille's Robert Eckhardt.

Unfortunately my team didn't win the challenge, but it was a great time working alongside expert chefs from locally run restaurants that really care about their community, especially on an issue like hunger, which unfortunately is all too prevalent in our land of plenty.

Right here in the Southeast Valley, one in four children experience food insecurity, meaning they don't always have access to adequate nutrition. And 2 million Arizonans are considered working poor, meaning they live below the federal poverty standard.

My friends at United Food Bank are dedicated to fighting those numbers, and they do it by serving 51,000 people a day. But the need is more than they can serve. Which is why I'm asking folks to start their own food drives. It's really not that hard. Heck if I can do it, anyone can.
