Just a couple of weeks ago, when there was an arrest in the I-10 freeway shootings case (/story/news/local/phoenix/breaking/2015/09/18/doug-ducey-phoenix-freeway-shootings-suspect-custody/72439462/) late on a Friday after the newsroom had cleared out, I tried to reach Jim on his cell phone several times, but no avail. I was about to go to plan B, when he finally picked up.

"Jim, where are you?"

"I'm at Target, buying dog food. What's up?"

"There's been an arrest in the freeway shootings, and we need someone to go to his father's house and see if he'll talk."

Jim didn't even bother hitting checkout.

"I'm on my way."

To an editor, those are mighty comforting words.

Jim got the interview that night and gave <u>Republic readers an exclusive window (/story/news/local/phoenix/breaking/2015/09/19/phoenix-freeway-shootings-bullet-fragments-lead-suspect-leslie-allen-merritt-jr/72487660/)</u> into the world of the man who had just been arrested in connection with one of the Valley's highest-profile crimes of the moment.

It wasn't the first time. Jim has a knack for getting people to open up to him, even after they've slammed doors in the faces of other reporters. As a police reporter, Jim's usually approaching people who are not at their best -- people who've been involved in a crime or a tragedy. But they always talk to Jim, and the reason is because he treats them like people and not like stories.

When I was editing the *Mesa Republic*, I was reunited with Jim after many years, and we did some great work together, covering the big disasters like a transformer fire that left half of Mesa without power in 2011 in the middle of summer and the vicious storm that pounded the Southeast Valley in 2010 and caused widespread flooding and millions of dollars in damage.

But some of Jim's best work wasn't on cop beat. I'm thinking of the series he did on the <u>importance of preserving Mesa's past by saving its historic buildings (/community/mesa/articles/20130329mesa-diving-lady-future-bright.html)</u>. If you drive down Main Street near Lindsay at night, you'll see the gorgeous 1950s neon "Diving Lady" motel sign. After that 2010 storm, it lay in shards in a motel parking lot. But when Jim began reporting on

its significance, he raised enough community awareness that a campaign was started to restore it to its former and present glory.

Jim's retiring from The Republic this week, but it's more than just The Republic's loss. It's your loss as well. I'm sure there will be a lot of baseball, hiking and hanging out with his dog in his future. As for ours, we'll have to finally figure out what that Plan B is.
