Empty bowls lined tables at a room at Mesa Community College last Wednesday.

The ceramic vessels were designed by students and faculty at the college, 1833 W. Southern Ave., or by artists at the Mesa Arts Center, 1 E. Main St. Anyone who paid \$10 for a handcrafted bowl was welcome to a hearty helping of lentil or coconut curry soup.

Proceeds from the sale of the bowls went to the Paz de Cristo Community Center, which provides anti-hunger and empowerment support for the East Valley's homeless, unemployed, working poor and their families, according to

The annual Empty Bowls event has been held for more than 25 years, Linda Speranza, who has taught ceramics at Mesa Community College since 1983, said.

"As things go on people take ownership of different parts of the event and step up to the plate. It's such a win-win situation," she said. "If everyone pitches in and buys a bowl, together we make a difference to help Paz de Cristo. That's the beauty of this event – that you can participate and be part of a group to support them and a \$10 donation goes a long way for them. They can buy roughly \$80 worth of food through their resources with a \$10 donation.'

She said Empty Bowls is a nationwide movement of ceramic artists to feed the needy in their local area. "There are parameters in order to be able to use the name Empty Bowls. Everything that's in here – all of the supplies, everything has to be donated. So the food's donated, the clay to make the bowls is donated," she said. "And then 100 percent of the proceeds go to the charity.... And then the other thing is the money has to go to a local organization around you, not to a big national organization."

Empty Bowls was held 10:30 a.m.-3 p.m. and 5-8 p.m. on Oct. 21 at MCC. It will also be held 10:30 a.m.-3 p.m. and 5-8 p.m. on Nov. 3 at Mesa Community College at Red Mountain, 7110 E. McKellips Road.

"The same experience in just a couple weeks," Ms. Speranza said.
