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At the time, Mesa was nowhere near as developed as it is today and The Landmark was nearly the only place in town to grab a bite. But The Landmark wasn't riding the gravy train, not yet anyway.

"The first five years were tough," Candy Ellis said. "Family members would come in and dress up and sit at a table so somebody would be in the dining room on slow nights, but it built up."

The Landmark's big break came in the late '80s when a dining critic wrote a glowing review of the restaurant, and even went as far as to tell the Ellis family that they needed to prepare for a major uptick in business.

That review is what really launched The Landmark into being, well, a landmark, known for its stick-to-your-ribs comfort food.

"We had people come in and tell us, 'Oh, you should try this, do this for your menu,'" Candy said. "But we said, 'No,' we wanted to do the heartland — the things that grandma would have put on the table."



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Many people have passed through The Landmark's historic doorways, including Sally Harrison, president/CEO of the Mesa Chamber of Commerce, who fell in love with the restaurant's salad room.

"The food was great and the history of the building is so interesting," Harrison said in an email. "As I learned more about the building and its early days as Mesa Community College, it became even more special."

However, as with all great things, they usually have to come to an end and The Landmark Restaurant is no exception. The restaurant served its last meal on May 31, marking the end of one chapter and the beginning of another.


Candy said the new owner of the building plans to use the building as a venue for weddings and other events, but not continue as a restaurant.

"It's been good," Candy said. "I think this is going out the right way."

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
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
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
